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
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YOKED TO YOUR LORD... WHAT?

Matthew 11 records Jesus' remarkable invitation, for you, for us all – perhaps for all creation. A number of years ago I was drawn to the simplicity and the sheer brilliance of this statement; I am truly mesmerized by it.

First, let me contextualize this message from the 'rabbi, speaker, miracle worker', Jesus of Nazareth. He and His disciples were travelling through the 'Sea of Galilee district' when Jesus' cousin and forerunner John – then in prison for offending King Herod, sent his disciples to ask a poignant question, "Are you the one who was to come, or should we expect someone else?" WHOA, what a question! I will let you check out Jesus' answer in Matthew 11: 4-6, especially verse 6. Suffice to say: Jesus was having to defend His identity, redirect John's impatience and bring clarity to how God works. (A pervasive mystery for us all).

Jesus spends that day seeking to refocus His hearers – especially disciples, on the fulfillment of God's will in Him. Indeed part of His message is judgment directed towards local towns - even of His ministry centre Capernaum. At the end of his prophecy He prays thanking God that "...you have hidden these things from the wise and learned, and revealed them to little children." (Matthew 11:25). A profound challenge for us all.

At the end of His wide bearth of teaching, He gives His call to us "Come to me, all you, (your name here) who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you, (your name here) will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11: 28-30)

As a farm boy (dirt in my blood) I am profoundly impressed with Jesus' statement. He is willing to unburden us - take our burdens not destroy them. He does take our sin (we'll consider that in months to come) but He does so to give us rest, then brilliantly He invites us to take on His yoke - to learn from Him and share our burdens. Yoked with Jesus we pull together. A donkey can carry 20-30% of its weight, however it can pull 200% (10X). Yes, Jesus is saying He can help us understand how to pull our burdens rather than carry them, AND yoked with Him, He actually shares our burdens. WOW, what an offer! I don't know about you but yoked with Jesus I just imagine going in circles with an imbalance of power, but He graciously pulls with us. WOW!

Jesus invites John, his disciples and us all, here, now! So where are you in this passage? Weary, burdened, yoked with Jesus, learning, rested? I hope you can make Jesus' invitation into a prayer you pray regularly, habitually and for others. Rest easy in Him!

HAVE A COFFEE WITH HARTLEY RUSSELL

I had the unique opportunity to sit down with Hartley Russell, The Peoples Church Youth and Young Adults Pastor. Get yourself a coffee and join us in our conversation:

Ken Park (KP): We work in different areas of TPC but certainly there is a grace & gospel integration. What delineates those with whom you work?

Hartley Russell (HR): I lead our Senior Youth and Young Adults ministry, ages 13 all the way up to those who identify as young adults up to age 30.

KP: How do you typically describe your job?

HR: We seek to come alongside families to see their young people walk closely with Jesus and care for them wholistically, spiritually, relationally, mentally and emotionally. We exist to support families and see their teenagers know and walk with Jesus. Also, to engage in His mission in this world; we really seek to disciple youth and young adults through missions, and for missions. Ultimately, we seek to send them as missionaries of our ministry to universities. We see our high school ministry really as a four year long missionary training program where we are equipping and investing in them to be missionaries sent into wherever God has them.

KP: Where is God working in His ministry with you?

HR: It's really interesting, for many people when we look at the time of COVID we think of it as a really difficult time for the Church, but there are countless students in our ministry who have gotten a lot more serious about their faith. When we ask them what was the moment you wanted to give your whole life to Jesus and follow Him, every single one of them literally says it was during COVID when they were all alone that God met with them and they grew in their faith. It's a really cool thing to know that COVID was actually a wonderful time when God moved powerfully in our youth and our families as much as it was difficult in so many other ways for all of us.

We are also seeing a lot of our young people excited about missions, about sharing Jesus with their peers in school but also as we look to bring our youth overseas on mission. Another really exciting thing is that we, over the last three years, commissioned and sent out about 30 youth – now young adults – into universities as missionaries. It's exciting to hear reports about all that God is doing in and through them on their campuses, as well as seeing their excitement and joy of walking with God and following Him as a part of His mission. I wish so badly that all of you reading this could have a conversation with them and see the joy on their faces, and in their words. We are seeing God work in equipping and raising up our youth to be on mission. Another cool thing we are seeing: a lot of youth in our community from non-Christian homes enter our doors, some 15-20 every week, hearing the gospel and engaging in conversation. We are excited to see how God is bringing youth to our space, that they see the church as a safe place, ask questions and build friendship. That's been pretty awesome!

KP: What is your greatest joy in your role at TPC?

HR: I would say two things:

- 1. The privilege and honour to walk with families to support them and their teens in following Jesus.
- At our church being a global mission church focusing on what God is doing around the world, it is such a great joy to actually bring our youth and young adults into those spaces of what God is doing around our world and to raise up our community here at Peoples to engage in global mission – a huge joy and unique part of being at The Peoples Church.

KP: If you could travel anywhere in the world without concern for money, time or threat, where would it be?

HR: A few places are on my bucket list for personal vacation: an island off Yemen called Socotra where the plant and animal life are only found on that island. It's really amazing. Right now, though where I would like to go is to my wife's hometown in Ukraine, a suburb of Karkiv - the eastern side of the country next to Russia. Anna and I had the privilege of going there 6 months before the war started and seeing where she grew up - where her great Grandmother built her home. It was one of the greatest honours of my life to be there and be with her family. To be in their backyard, their garden would be such a beautiful thing. One day we are hoping to go back.

KP: What is your favorite book or story in the Bible which you would want to time travel to?

HR: There are a few time periods: book of Daniel, in Babylon - seeing what it was like for him to seek its prosperity is of interest, but the story of Jesus on the boat during the storm: Jesus was asleep, he wakes up and calms the storm, then he goes to the Decapolis and meets a violent, demon possessed man. Jesus casts the demons into the pigs, but then comes one of the most beautiful statements we see in the gospel. I would love to see this moment when the people of the village, who ask Jesus to leave, see the man in his right mind, fully clothed, sitting at the feet of Jesus. Jesus healed him, cared for his physical need and as this man wants to learn, he asks to go with Jesus. Jesus says 'no' but to go and tell his people what God has done for him. The next time Jesus goes to the Decapolis there was over 10,000 people waiting to hear from Him. Just to be there in that moment seeing this man's faith and excitement over God's healing, and then to see him go and share: I would have loved to be there.

KP: What are top 3 words or statements you want us at Lifespring55 to know?

HR: We still need you! One dear senior comes every Friday as part of our youth leadership team and she prays, meets, and encourages our leaders and talks with some kids. Her role and presence is so invaluable; it is making such a difference. God is doing incredible things – breakthrough with a lot of our students. We believe it's because of prayer. We need you, your faith, your experience, your wisdom.

Please talk to our youth! Youth love it when people who are older, stop them and take notice of their life and care for them – even if it's to ask them their name and be praying for them.

Know you are valued! The next generation needs you, and our church needs you.

KP: How can we X, Boomer and post war generations pray for you personally?

HR: Pray for my wife, Anna and I that we stay at the feet of Jesus and lead from a secret and quiet place of the LORD. Sometimes the rhythm, routine, and busyness of ministry - doing things in our own strength, causes a loss of connection with the LORD. The commitment and discipline to stay close to Jesus is vital. **KP:** How can we pray for our youth and young adults?

HR: Pray for these specific things: our youth are really struggling with mental health; every year a number of youth have suicidal ideations, depression and anxiety, and many don't feel they can talk with their parents about it. Please pray against the enemy's attack, robbing their joy. Pray that his attacks will not stand. Pray that God would give freedom and victory in their minds and lives. Also, our society's conversation about sexuality is causing problems as our youth struggle to know how to 'be in the world but not of the world.' In particular, our younger youth are accepting this new sexuality agenda as the way it is. We are trying to help them develop a Biblical world view around sexuality. So please be praying that our young people genuinely believe in the authority, inerrancy & sufficiency of Scripture. This is God's Word to us!

HYMN REVIEW It is Well (When Peace Like a River)

Horatio Spafford (1828-1888) was quite successful—a senior partner in a Chicago law firm. He was also a committed Christian layman who supported the ministry of Dwight L. Moody. But he was faced with a series of tragedies that would have sunk a lesser man.

He had invested heavily in Chicago real estate, and the Great Fire of Chicago in October 1871 wiped him out financially.

Then, in 1873, he and his family were planning a visit to Europe. He was delayed by business concerns but sent his family ahead on the ocean liner *Ville Du Havre*. Mid-ocean, their ship was struck by an English ship, the *Lochearn*. *The* *Ville Du Havre* quickly sank, resulting in the deaths of 226 people—among them Stafford's four daughters.

Spafford's wife survived the wreck and sent a telegram saying only "Saved alone."

Spafford boarded a ship to join his wife in England, where the rescue vessel had taken his wife. He asked the captain of the ship to point out the location of the wreck that had taken the lives of his daughters. When they came to that place, he stood on deck contemplating the terrible thing that had happened to his family. But then, sustained by his faith that his daughters were not at the bottom of the ocean, but were rather in the bosom of the Heavenly Father, he retired to his cabin where he wrote:

When peace, like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, It is well, it is well with my soul. It is well (it is well), with my soul (with my soul), It is well, it is well with my soul.

But the Spaffords were to endure one more tragedy. They had three more children. In 1880, their son, also named Horatio, died of scarlet fever. To compound that tragedy, their church told the Spaffords that their son's death was God's judgment on them for unspecified sins.

The Spaffords responded by moving to Jerusalem with a small group of like-minded people. They founded The American Colony, which engaged in philanthropic work among the people of that region without regard to religious preferences. They gained great favor in the region as a result of their work with hospitals, soup kitchens, and orphanages—work that continued well into the 20th century.

Spafford died of malaria in 1888, just days before his 60th birthday. He was buried in Jerusalem.

It is tempting to think of the Spaffords as people whose lives were marked by tragedy. It would be more appropriate to think of them as people whose lives were characterized by triumph over tragedy.

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REVISITING THE VITALITY OF VISITATION



In the parable of the sheep & goats (Matthew 25: 31-48), Jesus makes a fascinating future statement, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me...Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Although we all wrestle with our capacity, character, and coordination of connecting with another, it seems to me that Jesus is emphatically saying when we care, we are truly living in the humanity he intended.

So when you entertain, host, enjoy, preside or visit with others consider these good habits to practice & develop:

 Be loving. Seek to love the one(s) you visit, their family, friends, etc – even if they are difficult to love. Ask God to fill you up to do so; He visits with you.

- Be time sentitive. Ask how long a person wants to visit. Focus on 15 minute increments, listening for 'invitation to go' cues. Watch body language.
- 3. Be respectful. Let others go first, let them guide you in topic, ask questions.
- 4. Be a focused listener. Start with simple questions: job, family, vehicle, pets, hobbies, arts, sports. Active listening is one of the highest forms of love.
- 5. Be confidential. Take care when asking, and hearing deeply personal issues. If unaware of the public, private divide, ask: can I share this?
- Be natural, relaxed. If you feel at ease or uncertain, be honest but sensitive. Express healthy barriers and be careful not to overpromise.
- 7. Be discerning. Ask follow up questions:

"If I understand you correctly...". Resist desires to fix problems, leave it to the LORD or professionals.
